

Est measured and found that the water in the "Thousand Gallon" tank was 29 inches deep, instead of the maximum (ball-cock controlled) 52. This was at 9 pm on Thursday; the level was never as low again, and out one measurements (7.15, 12.30, 9.30) showed it rising slowly and irregularly until by the morning of the fifth day (28" July) the maximum was reached. Measures included: no washing of Clothes; minimum washing of skins; bathing parades with soap a towels; washing up curtailed, And most of these were enthusiastically supported.


